Department for Education Vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium:

ALL pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

OBJECTIVE:

To achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE at Gilbert Scott Primary School. The focus of spending should lead to long lasting impact against the vision (above) that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport.*
